Introduction

A Verse that Confounds Scholars: Out of His fullness, we have all received (John 1:16) The common view: These words are from John the Apostle (many years later)

The speaker's view: These words are from John the Baptist (before Jesus' ministry)

Points raised by the common view against the speaker's view:

John 1:16 looks back in time. (This is true, but that is not a problem for my view). Scholars ask, "How can the Baptist look back at Jesus in John 1:16?" Therefore, they assume that 1:16-18 are the words of John the apostle.

John 1:16 says "From His fullness we all have received."

Scholars ask, "How could the Baptist possibly know this by John 1:16?" Therefore, they assume that 1:16-18 are the words of John the apostle.

Counter-Point in favor of the speaker's view:

The narrator refers to the unbelieving readers as: YOU The narrator refers to apostles as: WE

You and we in speeches refer to characters in John.

Scholars wrongly treat WE in John 1:16 as if the verse said YOU

Making the Case for the Speaker's View:

Where (in John 1) would Jesus' baptism fit? (John's Gospel omits His baptism)

Most scholars regard Jesus' baptism as happening after John 1:19

Jesus' baptism did not happen after John 1:19. It occurred even before John 1:15: John 1-2 has a series of days (1:29, 35, 43; 2:1), but Mark 1:12 says immediately

This view resolves a major bump in the common scholarly interpretation of John 1

The Baptist is a prophet—even more than a prophet. (He received revelation from God)

Cf. Matt 11:9 // Luke 7:28

John must be knowledgeable about Jesus, so he can magnify Jesus and minimize himself

Jesus' first disciples start out with much greater knowledge of Jesus than we imagine
